DETERMINED DEFIANT DISRUPTIVE



In 2022, while it sometimes felt like the world was defaulting on the promise of progress, women changemakers did not. From Afghanistan to Iran, from Ukraine to the United States, women continued to challenge despotism, defy the trend toward disempowerment, and disrupt the forces that throttle women's potential and curtail their futures.

2022 MILESTONES

JANUARY

For the first time in United States history, images of women are depicted on U.S. currency quarters. The American women quarters program was created to celebrate the accomplishments and contributions made by women in the United States, with the first released coins featuring celebrated writer and social activist Maya Angelou. Quarters featuring Dr. Sally Ride, Wilma Mankiller, Nina Otero-Warren, and Anna May Wong were also introduced in 2022.



FEBRUARY

Zara Rutherford, a 19-year-old Belgian-British aviator, became the youngest woman to fly solo around the world. The achievement came after she completed a five-month journey spanning five continents, flying more than 32,000 miles (about 51,500 kilometers) in January. The daughter of two pilots, Rutherford broke two Guinness World Records: one for being the youngest woman to make the journey, and another for being the first woman to circumnavigate the globe in a microlight aircraft.



MARCH

In its annual Women's History Month proclamation, the White House acknowledges how the COVID-19 pandemic exposed and exacerbated gender inequities in the American work force, citing disparities that have disproportionately impacted working women. The Biden Administration also acknowledges how the pandemic multiplied the burden on paid and unpaid caregivers and increased rates of gender-based violence.

APRIL

A new set of stamps is issued by the United Kingdom's Royal Mail service in tribute to women's vital contribution to World War II. "Their bravery and sacrifice are often overlooked," said a spokesperson for the Royal Mail. The 10-stamp collection includes rare photos of female pilots and women "codebreakers" who worked on wartime cryptography efforts, to name a few of the wartime job specialties highlighted on the stamps.



MAY

Leadership has a new home! On May 5, 2022, the doors open to the Vital Voices Global Headquarters for Women's Leadership – the world's first global embassy for women. Our co-founders and local and global community are on hand for the ribbon cutting, which marked a new monument to women's leadership in the United States capital. Across America, less than 10 percent of historic monuments commemorate the accomplishments of women, according to Smithsonian magazine.

JUNE

The United States sees a rollback of women's rights as the landmark Roe v. Wade legislation is overturned by the U.S. Supreme Court, ending nearly 50 years of precedent. Vital Voices staff and supporters respond on the day of the announcement by joining protests that erupted on the steps outside the Supreme Court in Washington, D.C.

Ketanji Brown Jackson is sworn in as an associate justice to the Supreme Court, making her the first African-American woman and first former federal public defender to serve on the high court.

Disastrous flooding in Pakistan affects more than 33 million people, including 600,000 pregnant women who lack maternal healthcare services and millions of children left with no immunization or nutritional care in the aftermath of the natural disaster. In response, Vital Voices publishes a list of women in our network leading relief efforts on behalf of women and children to encourage the public to donate to those organizations. The floods continue through mid-November.



The United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) Platform of Women Leaders is launched at the 77th session of the General Assembly. Of the 193 Member States of the United Nations, only 28 have women serving as elected heads of state or government. The inaugural meeting focuses on accelerating the implementation of the UN Sustainable Development Goal 5, to achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls.

Yetunde Ayo Oyalowo, founder of Market Doctors, an organization providing healthcare to more than 120,000 people across Nigeria, is named winner of the 2022 WE Empower UN SDG Challenge.

OCTOBER

Oleksandra Matviichuk, a Ukrainian human rights lawyer and civil society leader from Kyiv, accepts the Nobel Peace Prize on behalf of the Center for Civil Leaders in Ukraine.

Iranian rights activist Narges Mohammadi, who is currently imprisoned by the Iranian regime in an attempt to silence her, wins the Nobel Peace Prize. Only a month later, she'll begin a hunger strike after being denied treatment for a life-threatening health concern.

Natural disaster devastates North Africa, with a 6.8-magnitude earthquake striking Morocco, killing 3,000 people, and cataclysmic floods in Libya sweeping away hundreds of lives. Women and children are always the most severely affected by natural disaster, with a fatality rate 14 times higher than that of men.

NOVEMBER

The European Parliament passes a law mandating increased female participation on publicly traded companies' boards by July 2026, shattering a glass ceiling following a decade-long battle to enact the legislation.

Out of the 110 world leaders who attend the 2022 United Nations Climate Change Conference, also known as the Conference of the Parties (COP27), just seven are women. Despite clear evidence that girls and women bear a disproportionate burden from climate change, women made up less than 34 percent of the country negotiating teams at the summit.

DECEMBER

The United Nations Member States on the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW) heed the call of Iranian women to remove the Islamic Republic of Iran from the CSW, the world's leading intergovernmental body tasked with protecting women's rights and promoting gender equality. The decision followed the tragic death of Mahsa Jina Amini, a 22-year-old Iranian woman who died while in police custody after being detained for the "improper wearing of the hijab."

Amid ensuing worldwide protests, a coalition of Iranian women launched a global campaign to remove Iran from the CSW for its human rights violations against women and girls. Supported by Vital Voices and the For Freedoms artists collective, the coalition called out the Iran regime's long-standing, systematic oppression of women and girls in an open letter in the New York Times, which was signed by over a dozen women heads of state and thousands of women luminaries. After four months of protests and cries for justice, on December 15, 2022, the CSW Member States voted to remove the Iran regime from the Commission, marking the first time in history a Member State was voted off the CSW.







INTRODUCTION

Vital Voices celebrated a historic milestone this year – our 25 year anniversary. What began with a handful of women leaders driven by an audacious vision for a more equal, inclusive, and just world has become a global force for women's leadership.

Across 185 countries and territories, through a network of more than 20,000 women, we have pioneered a powerful model for social change, investing directly in women leaders who are taking on the world's greatest challenges. Collectively, Vital Voices leaders have positively impacted the lives of millions of people, advancing creative solutions to global problems such as climate change, economic inequality, and gender-based violence.

As we approached our 25th year, we redoubled our efforts and proved the power of collective action. From evacuating and resettling nearly 1,000 Afghan women leaders and family members, to the unprecedented campaign to successfully remove the Islamic Republic of Iran from the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women, to opening the Vital Voices Global Headquarters for Women's Leadership – the world's first global embassy for women leaders – Vital Voices consistently does the impossible.

In a year of extraordinary global challenges, we expanded our programming, increased emergency assistance funding, and grew our dedicated team. Together with our Global Leadership Network, we rose to meet the need for extraordinary courage, vision, and leadership.

For 25 years, women leaders have improved lives, transformed communities, and accelerated progress worldwide. As we look to the future and consider all the work that lies ahead, we have never been more resolved to advance women's leadership and further expand our efforts to support, connect, and amplify leaders who are taking on the world's most urgent problems.

Together, we are building a more equitable, sustainable future for all.



Women are charting new paths to leadership. In this moment of extraordinary challenge, we cannot repair the world with conventional leadership and traditional thinking. Women lead differently. They are inclusive, collaborative, resourceful, and empathetic. Above all, they are driven by a deep sense of purpose. 

WHAT WE DO

2022 BY PROGRAM

In 2022, Vital Voices had 26 active programs – fellowships, training programs, grants, and urgent assistance projects whose impact spanned the globe. Below are selected highlights of what these programs achieved this year.

This year, we launched the VV Visionaries program in partnership with the Estée Lauder Emerging Leaders Fund (ELELF), the charitable fund of Estée Lauder, to support the next generation of emerging leaders who are redefining leadership in their everyday lives. Two cohorts of 50 women visionaries over the age of 18 participated in a seven-week immersive virtual experience. The curriculum is built on the proven leadership model of Vital Voices, incorporating lessons in leadership from Estée Lauder executives and Vital Voices Global Network leaders. Twenty program participants from across both cohorts were also welcomed to a three-day, in-person Visionaries Summit, hosted at the Vital Voices Global Headquarters for Women's Leadership, where they engaged in interactive workshops, panels, and one-on-one coaching with Estée Lauder executives.

Voices that Inspire, or Voces que Inspiran, supports young women who are making a positive impact in Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Guatemala, Mexico, Panama, and Peru. Through the 10-week fellowship, participants increase their opportunities, leadership capacity, network, and resources, sparking a global movement to create sustainable change and transform the meaning of leadership. In 2022, the program welcomed its third cohort, graduating 16 young women leaders who are better prepared to drive change in their communities. The program also disbursed 12 grants to program participants who are working on locally based projects to help solve problems that they have identified and are determined to make right.

Vital Voices launched our first-ever online feepaying Vital Voices Leadership Journey course with a cohort of 100 leaders. The innovative, seven-week course helps changemakers build their leadership skills to make a positive impact in their community and beyond. In 2022, Vital Voices provided over 70 percent of the participants with a full scholarship, ensuring that stronger leadership skills are within everyone's reach. After the initial course, which received highly positive feedback, the curriculum was tailored and facilitated for 13 other programs across Vital Voices, reaching more than 500 additional women leaders.

VITAL VOICES LEADERSHIP JOURNEY

GLOBAL AMBASSADORS PROGRAM



This one-year accelerator fellowship for women at the helm of small and medium for-profit social enterprises is designed to enhance the ability of women entrepreneurs to grow their businesses, catalyze economic growth, and create pathways to prosperity in their communities and around the world. After the recruitment and selection process in the fall of 2022, 100 women leaders of for-profit purpose-driven businesses from 43 countries were selected to participate the 2023 VV GROW Fellowship. Visa joined the program as one of the program funding partners.

This unique and powerful partnership between Vital Voices and Bank of America connects emerging women leaders (mentees) at a tipping point in their professional, business, and leadership paths with established women executives (Global Ambassadors or mentors). The program takes an innovative, immersive approach, using in-person exchanges and an online curriculum to build organizational management, financial acumen, and leadership skills. The 21st Global Ambassadors Program marked our first post-COVID inperson gathering, bringing together 10 pairs of Global Ambassadors and mentees at the Vital Voices Global Headquarters for Women's Leadership in October 2022. This year, we celebrated the first time a former mentee served as a Global Ambassador, and we added new sessions on mental wellness and on the Sustainable Development Goals.

This year, we supported 15 international women leaders from 11 countries, giving them the opportunity to develop their business and leadership skills and gain experience in a U.S. business environment. The program – a public–private mentorship program that builds the business and leadership skills of international women professionals – successfully engaged, trained, and supported these emerging businesswomen and entrepreneurs to grow as leaders. The participants are paying it forward, having committed to providing opportunities for women in their communities and businesses.



WE EMPOWER

The five 2022 awardees of WE Empower – a first-of-its-kind global business competition for women entrepreneurs who are advancing the UN Sustainable Development Goals – came together for a week in New York City during the UN General Assembly in September 2022. The awardees attended global conferences, joined high-level dinners, and participated in mentoring and training sessions with established women entrepreneurs. The highlight of the week is always Pitch Night, when the awardees present their business pitches to a live audience that votes on the winner.

This year's event, which brought approximately 200 people to DVF Studios, was hosted by Vital Voices Board Member Diane von Furstenberg, with expert judges in attendance.

After lively presentations, the honors went to Yetunde Ayo Oyalowo, the founder of Market Doctors, an organization that works through community marketplaces to provide healthcare to over 120,000 people across 12 states in Nigeria. Oyalowo received a \$25,000 grant to further her goals, while each of the other awardees received \$5,000 for their organizations:

Vital Voices carried out a successful partnership with Google.org, collaborating with them on their first \$25 million Impact Challenge for Women and Girls. From the 7,800 applicants, we selected 34 organizations, each of whom received grants of \$250,000 to \$1 million in impact funding. Additionally, we delivered valuable content and webinars with the Google Accelerator, piloted VV Gender Equality Advising, and tailored our Vital Voices Leadership Journey for the group, successfully delivering it to 35 grantees.

This capacity-building fellowship is designed for outstanding women political leaders with the power and passion to make policy that advances the UN Sustainable Development Goals. In 2022, VVEngage brought together a cohort of 30 women political leaders from 26 countries. They represented the full landscape of political leadership roles, including parliamentarians, mayors, local government officials, activists, and journalists. The fellows engaged in virtual training, mentoring, and networking. In November, they gathered for an in-person training and networking session at Vital Voices Global Headquarters for Women's Leadership.

VVEngage maintains an alumni network that in 2022 spanned 114 fellows around the world

Each year, to mark International Women's Day in March, the Vital Voices Global Mentoring Walks connect women leaders around the world to share challenges and solutions and form supportive bonds that foster growth, confidence, and leadership. Each walk is organized by local Vital Voices supporters. This year, 120 Global Mentoring walks in 103 cities in more than 40 countries brought together nearly 15,000 established and emerging women leaders to learn from each other, support one another, and walk together in the name of our global community.

GLOBAL MENTORING WALKS



In the aftermath of extreme acts of gender-based violence, the Voices Against Violence initiative gives survivors the assistance they need and the justice they deserve. This ambitious umbrella initiative – a public–private partnership with the U.S. Department of State and the Avon Foundation for Women –includes the Urgent Assistance Fund (UAF), which provides direct funding for survivors; the innovative, cross-regional, year-long VAV Fellowship; and country-specific Justice Institutes that improve countries' institutional response and survivors' access to justice.

In 2022 alone, we were able to reach over 31,000 individuals indirectly through subawards that supported a variety of projects, advocacy work, monitoring efforts, and capacity-building trainings. Additionally, the VAV Peace and VAV Fellowship programs met in person in Montenegro and South Africa, where fellows had the ability to talk through cross-cutting issues. This year, we also ran four sessions of the VAV Bridge Program, which builds the capacities of the trusted local non-profits around the world who we work with through the UAF. Funds are awarded to their local organizations, who pass on 100% of the resources to survivors of gender-based violence. Through training on fundraising, grants management, and case management best practices, VAV Bridge aims to help our local partners build up their organizations, increase their fundraising, and improve their capacity to help survivors.



VOICES AGAINST VIOLENCE

Impact highlights

CRISIS RESPONSE

On March 1, 2022, as part of an overall effort to ramp up support to women leaders and women-led organizations, Vital Voices established the Crisis Response Team (CRT). Our aim was to formalize and scale the work we'd been pursuing for decades: responding to the needs of women changemakers when they need it most. In its first year, the CRT has supported dozens of women leaders, touched the lives of thousands of people, and indirectly reached an audience of millions.

The team immediately launched into action to confront the effects of the war in Ukraine. We put the boots of two staff members on the ground in the region to perform a rapid assessment of the refugee situation and response efforts. They found that, faced with a refugee crisis of a scale not seen since World War II, Ukrainian women leaders have stepped up to work on the front lines.

The CRT swiftly provided these leaders with critical support and emergency aid. Since March, the team has disbursed approximately \$250,000 in direct grants to local, womenled NGOs that have pivoted from their usual causes to offer desperately needed humanitarian aid for their neighbors. Grants from the CRT have touched the lives of nearly 20,000 people whose daily existence has been upended by the war. The NGOs we support are meeting the basic needs of internally displaced persons and providing casework support, psychosocial services, transportation, and other assistance – from hygiene packs and schoolbooks to migration counseling and intervention to prevent human trafficking.

This support, and the CRT itself, was made possible by a generous gift of \$1 million per year over three years for Vital Voices to expand our crisis response efforts. The grant was a direct result of our work to help evacuate over a thousand Afghan women leaders and family members in the fall of 2021 when the Taliban threatened their lives.

In 2022, we drastically broadened our support for individual women leaders at risk. Through the Crisis Response Urgent Assistance Fund, the CRT has been rapidly disseminating emergency funds to meet the specific needs of endangered women leaders in critical situations, who often have nowhere else to turn. The grants cover medical expenses, relocation and shelter, livelihood support, psychological services, and legal services.

This work has already reached a global scale – but in 2024, we aim to expand it further, into full-fledged case management services. Ultimately, we envision direct funding and casework that stretches across the globe.

The CRT is also conducting advocacy, amplifying the efforts of women leaders who are laboring to keep international attention on the catastrophic human suffering in Ukraine. For instance, Vital Voices collaborated with Zoya Lytvyn on the script of her TED talk, in which she discusses her work educating thousands of displaced Ukrainian children through the online school she established during COVID. The talk has already been viewed online more than 2 million times.

The mission of the CRT is to ensure the safety of threatened women leaders and activists around the world – physically, mentally, fiscally, and digitally. If this year has proven nothing else, it has demonstrated the need for this mission in a world that is at least as charged with danger as it is full of promise for the future.





Vital Voices was created for and because of women leaders 25 years ago. In 1997, we set out to create a space for women to be heard. A quarter-century later, in May 2022, we celebrated a momentous achievement with the official opening of the Vital Voices Global Headquarters for Women's Leadership.

Located in the heart of Washington, D.C., along a portion of 16th Street known as 'Equality Corridor,' our new global headquarters is surrounded by neighbors, both past and present, who have profoundly influenced movements for civil rights, women's suffrage, and LGBTQIA+ rights.

The Vital Voices Global Headquarters for Women's Leadership is a safe haven, a resource, and a gathering space for women leaders. A collaborative and inclusive space for all, its doors are open to local and visiting women's organizations with limited resources, offering a place to convene, innovate, plan and act.

Our ambitious dream to create a building unlike any other was made possible with the support of a dedicated collective. In large part, our headquarters is a building for women, imagined by women, and funded by women.

Designed to reflect our history as an organization and a movement, its innovative spaces pay tribute to several remarkable leaders and champions of Vital Voices – from the Amanda Gorman and Malala Yousafzai Leadership Library to the Diane von Furstenberg Sky Lounge to the InMaat Leadership Forum. From roots to rooftop, the headquarters is filled with spaces to meet, learn, and collaborate.



We commemorated the official opening of the Vital Voices Global Headquarters for Women's Leadership with the first-ever Vital Voices Festival. At the ribbon-cutting ceremony – which followed a march led by young women from the White House to the doors of the building – Vital Voices Founder Hillary Rodham Clinton delivered remarks alongside D.C. Mayor Muriel Bowser, Vital Voices Board Member Diane von Furstenberg, and President and CEO Alyse Nelson.

The three days that followed brought together leading voices from around the world for dozens of inspiring leadership talks, performances, book events, and exhibits, as well in-depth panel discussions on pressing issues, from climate justice to peacebuilding. The event attracted media coverage at home and around the world. U.S. broadcast news coverage – including on CBS Evening News, PBS NewsHour, ABC, and C-SPAN – reached nearly 7 million households, and national recognition didn't end with the close of the Festival: the International Academy of Digital Arts later recognized the event at its 2022 Anthem Awards as the year's 'Best Human & Civil Rights Event.'





2022 EVENT HIGHLIGHTS

In its first year, the Vital Voices Global Headquarters for Women's Leadership (VVHQ) has hosted dozens of events, from high-level panels to one-on-one meetings between women leaders from all corners of the Earth. It has welcomed the public through its broad front door for book talks and film screenings. It has been the venue for convenings, conferences, and meetings designed to advance women's leadership, and it has served as a locus of action where the architects of our future can come together and draw up blueprints for a more equitable world.

Several of our programs held their in-person convenings at VVHQ, bringing remarkable women together to connect, develop their leadership skills, and work with one another on solutions to the world's greatest challenges. Panel discussions and leadership talks brought visibility to global issues affecting women and girls; collaborations in the form of executive meetings, forums, and conferences helped drive progress toward solving them. Book talks, film screenings, and performances amplified the work and stories of determined women leaders who are passionate about creating a more equitable world.

VOICES OF SOLIDARITY AWARDS

This year, we celebrated the 9th annual Voices of Solidarity Awards, recognizing the leadership and contributions of phenomenal male allies who are using their platforms to advocate for women and girls at home and around the world. Held in New York City, the awards were hosted by entrepreneur, activist, and Vital Voices Board member Diane von Furstenberg. We were joined by presenters including Emmy- and Tony-nominated actor Arian Moayed; Karlie Kloss, founder of Kode with Klossy; and Vital Voices Board Member Zainab Salbi, founder of Women for Women International.

As women's rights are assailed in every sphere, we need allies like these leaders more than ever before, and Vital Voices was proud to be able to recognize their efforts for justice and equality.



AFGHAN WOMEN & GIRLS

When the Taliban took over Afghanistan in 2021, they began going door-to-door in search of women's rights activists. The Emergency Fund for Afghan Women was launched to safeguard the Afghan women leaders who are most at risk: women's rights activists, journalists, educators, civil society leaders, human rights defenders, and direct service providers. In coalition with Georgetown University's Institute for Women, Peace and Security, human rights expert and founder of Women for Women International Zainab Salbi, and trusted on-the-ground humanitarian organizations, Vital Voices helped evacuate hundreds of Afghan women leaders and their family members – a total of 1,168 people.

In 2022, we successfully resettled 922 individuals in safe, permanent homes in Canada, England, France, Germany, Sweden, Türkiye, and the U.S. As the refugees waited in transition countries for resettlement paperwork to be processed, we offered holistic aid and organized humanitarian support – especially in Albania, the temporary destination of most evacuees. More than 300 children and adolescents participated in educational courses and English classes, and our Afghan community welcomed 16 babies into the world. Mothers and newborns alike received top-quality obstetrics and neonatal care, part of the comprehensive healthcare and medicine we made available to the evacuees in Albania. We also provided critical psychosocial and trauma support, as well as case management, educational support, and consultation and legal aid to help families plan for resettlement.

Throughout the year, Vital Voices and our partners have engaged in targeted advocacy efforts to keep global attention on the crisis for women and girls in Afghanistan. We are committed to remaining an ally in their fight for freedom – and to ensuring that the voices of the evacuated women leaders are heard as they call out for support for all those left behind. In 2023, we aim to continue working with the evacuated women, assisting them in adapting to their new lives in exile and helping them develop their leadership skills. We will stay by their side throughout the coming years, no matter what they may bring.

ALL EYES ON IRAN

In the fall of 2022, Vital Voices and the artist collective For Freedoms teamed up with a coalition of Iranian women and world leaders to launch an unprecedented campaign urging UN Member States to heed the call of Iranians and remove the Islamic Republic from the Commission on the Status of Women, the global body dedicated to promoting gender equality and women's empowerment.

The efforts followed the death of 22-year-old Mahsa Zhina Amini, a Kurdish Iranian woman who was arrested and detained by the Islamic Republic's 'morality police' for the improper wearing of a hijab. When Mahsa died in police custody, her name became the battle cry of a movement. Her story was the spark that lit the long-simmering fuse of dissension. Thousands of Iranians took to the streets in protest of the Islamic Republic's oppressive regime.

Despite its long-standing and systematic discrimination against women and girls, the Islamic Republic had been elected to the Commission on the Status of Women in 2022. It was serving as a member while overseeing a brutal crackdown on protests calling for human rights, freedom, and democracy. The regime's corruption, abuse, and hypocrisy were a crime against human reason and a gross violation of human justice.

With the coalition and For Freedoms, Vital Voices drafted an open letter on the issue, and we called on women leaders from around the world to support the petition. Within days of the campaign's launch, the letter's signatories included 13 current and former women heads of state, along with former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton, former First Ladies Michelle Obama and Laura Bush, multiple Nobel Peace Laureates (including Malala Yousfazai), and an assembly of high-powered women leaders and activists, from Gloria Steinem to Christine Lagarde to Oprah Winfrey. On October 30, our coalition took out a full-page ad in the Sunday New York Times to feature the open letter. Vice President Kamala Harris soon announced the U.S. government's support for the removal of the Islamic Republic from the Commission, and the governments of New Zealand and Canada echoed her call.

Earlier this year, to the dismay of women's rig advocates around the world, Islamic Republic of Iran began a four-year term on the U.N.'s 48-member Commission on the Status of Wom This preeminent global body is exclusively dedicated to promoting gender equality and women's emoverment.

The Islamic Republic of Iran's long-standing, systematic oppression of women should have disqualified them from election to the CSW. For decades, gender inequality and discrimina against women have been legally enshrined in Iran. Under Iran's Penal Code and other laws a Iran iran iran's penal code and other laws as a regulations, Iranian women's rights are severel restricted in marriage, divorce, inheritance and custody. They must comply with the IRI's mandatory hijab laws from the onset of puberty

Because of the Islamic Republic's appalling reco on women's rights, and in light of the regime's ongoing, brutal crackdown on protesters, we insist that Iran's membership to the CSW be revoked. For every day that Islamic Republic of Iran remains a member of the Commission on the Status of Women, the body loses credibility.



The campaign was further amplified by a multiday, multi-media art installation, called "Eyes on Iran," which opened at FDR Four Freedoms State Park. The interactive installation by artist JR opened hearts, minds, and eyes alike, bringing attention to the ongoing protests and to Iranian women's call for action.

Our collective voices made a historic impact. On December 14, 2022, by a margin of 29 to eight, UN member states voted to remove the Islamic Republic from the Commission on the Status of Women, heeding the call of Iranian women in a show of global solidarity. By then, our open letter had accrued more than 100,000 signatures. Iran's removal from the Commission sent an unambiguous message that the world will not tolerate the suppression of women's voices – and that women in power will not stand idly by when regimes attempt to silence those who fight for freedom.


THE DVF AWARDS

Each year in Venice, Italy, Vital Voices Board Member Diane von Furstenberg and The Dillervon Furstenberg Family Foundation honor remarkable women changemakers who have demonstrated the courage to fight, the strength to survive, and the leadership to inspire.

The DVF Awards recognize, support, and amplify the voices of extraordinary women who are dedicated to improving the lives of other women. Since 2010, women leaders from more than thirty countries have received the award, along with a major grant to further their important work in the areas of climate change, immigration, fighting human trafficking, promoting gender equality, and preventing violence against women.

As a partner organization, Vital Voices supports and nominates outstanding women leaders for each year's awards. The 13th annual DVF Awards, which took place on September 1, 2022, celebrated the following honorees from the Vital Voices Global Network.

- Zoya Lytvyn, a Ukrainian educator, reformer, and impact entrepreneur, who was honored for her work to improve school education in Ukraine and ensure that displaced children can continue to attend school remotely.
- Hindou Oumarou Ibrahim, a member of the Mbororo pastoralist people in Chad and Founder and President of the Association for Indigenous Women and Peoples of Chad (AFPAT), who was honored for her advocacy for the greater inclusion of indigenous people and traditions in global climate action.
- Ten Women of Afghanistan who were evacuated by Vital Voices and a coalition of partners
 after the Taliban took over the country and the lives of women leaders were put at urgent
 risk. From the hundreds of activists, politicians, lawmakers, judges, artists, and human rights
 defenders we helped evacuate, Vital Voices selected 10 women who have shown resilience
 and strength in the face of unimaginable suffering, and who are using their voice to give a
 voice to those who need it most:
